Stay Warm & Comfortable SAFELY



Portable electric heaters, also known as space heaters, are often used during the winter months to add warmth to homes, boats and other small spaces. While effective and relatively inexpensive, space heaters are high wattage appliances and can be dangerous.

- PROPER PLACEMENT: 1. Keep combustible material such as beds, sofas, curtains, papers and clothes at least 3 feet from the front, sides and rear of the heater. 2. Insure that the heater is placed on a stable, level surface, and located where it will not be knocked over. 3. Never run the heater's cord under rugs or carpeting. This can damage the cord, causing it and nearby objects to burn.

- SAFE OPERATION: 1. Never leave heaters unattended with small children or pets. 2. During use, check frequently to determine if the heater plug or cord, wall outlet, or faceplate is HOT! If the plug, outlet or faceplate is hot, discontinue use of the heater, and have a qualified electrician check and/or replace the plug or faulty wall outlet(s). If the cord is hot, disconnect the heater and have it inspected/ repaired by an authorized repair person. 3. To prevent electrical shocks and electrocutions, always keep electric heaters away from water and NEVER touch an electric heater if you are wet.

- HEATER BASICS: 1. Never operate a heater you suspect is damaged. Before use, inspect the heater, cord and plug for damage. Follow all operation and maintenance instructions. 2. When purchasing a heater, ask the salesperson whether the heater has been safety-certified. A certified heater will have a safety certification mark. 3. Never power the heater with an extension cord or power strip and check to be sure the heater plug fits tightly into the wall outlet. If not, do not use the outlet to power the heater.
